
Our speaker for the day was Bob Henderson, a mechanical and nuclear engineer for the Bechtel Corp. He pointed out that Calif. will, in the near future, need 1,000 kilowats of power each year to meet its needs, and this requirement will increase as the population grows. Since the Federal Fuel Use Act restricts gas and oil being used as fuel, it would take 650 windmills located along the coast to generate the electricity needed by the State now. Geothermal energy, although an ideal of energy source, still only produces 1/2 the energy produced by an oil or coal fueled plant. Solar energy is good for space heating but is impractical to use in the generation of electricity unless it a put to work boiling water, then the steam from said water could be used to generate power. He noted that California should concentrate on using hydro-electric power due to our lack of coal. He went on to say that nuclear power is the cheapest and most plentiful and of needed by 1983 we should begin building plants now! He went on to note that the storing of used cores in lead casks underground, as the countries of Europe are doing, is safe provided that the casks are not disturbed for at least 450 years.

The Three Mile Island incident of just shortly ago was due to a mechanical failure caused by an operator's lack of knowledge. Valuable lesons were learned from this accident with efforts now being made to overcome the possibilities of another such incident.
