# Healdsburg Receives Ann and Art Weaver Scholarship Fund at Lt. Governor Installation

Established in 2008-2009 by then Diviision 32 Lt. Governor Rich Fuller of Windsor, the Anne and Art Weaver Scholarship Fund was presented to our club at the September 11 installation of the new Lt. Governor Eric Wheaton of Lakeport.

The scholarship, \$1000 is named in honor of Art Weaver who served three terms as Lt. Governor and his wife, Anne. The money is to be used at the club's discretion for an educational scholarship. Rich Fuller,in an email reponse to inquiry by the Builder's editor, explained that "this would be in addition to any scholarships the club awards and would be in the name of Anne and Art Weaver."

In his email Rich Fuller advised that as Lt. Governor in 2008-2009 he brought the idea of a Divisonal scholarship to his first Division Council Meeting in Willits in January, 2008.

"Knowing both Ann and Art Weaver, and just after her passing, I wanted to honor their more than 3 decades as Kiwanians. But also their dedication to education, not to mention Art's three terms as Lt. Governor."

The scholarship that was approved at the January, 2008 meeting operates in the following manner: each club donates \$100 to the fund yearly. Then at the annual installation of the Division Lt. Governor, a club's name is drawn "from the hat" and the club chosen will receive \$1000 from the fund. That club's name will be "removed from the hat" until each club's name has been drawn and awardec the scholarship money.

Rich explained that the balance of the funds will be maintained with the goal being for it to be self sustaining eventually. Currently the acount is maintained by the Windsor Club as it was the home club of the Lt. Governor at that time. The Windsor

Club maintains both a 501 ©(3) and 501 ©(4) foundation with a tax exempt status. An annual report of the status of the fundis presented at a DCM of the current Lt. Governor's choosing.

Representatives at the original meeting agreed that it would be the responsibility of the 17 clubs in the Division to make an annual payment of \$100 to the fund. If a club's name is drawn and if they are in arears they must bring their donations up to date and current to receive the scholarship monies. If that doesn't happen,, that club forfeits the award for that year and another's name is drawn. In addition the club in arears has its name removed (**Please See Page 3**)

## Kiwanis Donations to Community Organizations, Schools for the Past Five Years Total Over \$300,000

In his address following his installation as president of Kiwanis Dick Bugarske reminded his audience of all the financial aid the club has given to community organizations and to the schools over the past five years. He told the members and guests that treasurer Pete Peterson researched the information which only strengthened the members and the community beliefs that Kiwanis does a lot of good, living up to its goals of helping the youth of the community.

He pointed out that community service donations over the past five years totaled \$167,600. And who benefitted from our largesse? Such diverse and worthwhile organizations as American Legion Post 11 for fireworks (\$3500), Healdsburg Animal Shelter (\$1200), Healdsburg Boys and Girls Club (\$33,800), Boy Scout Troop 21 (\$17,900), Food Pantry (\$3,000), Future Farmers Country Fair (\$10,800), Habitat for Humanity (\$5,000), Healdsburg Hounds Boosters Club- Rec. Park (\$7,000), Healdsburg Graduation Celebration (\$1,000), Healdsburg Little League (\$12,500), Healdsburg Medical Explorer Post (\$2,000), Healdsburg Recreation Park Grandstand Renovation (\$25,000), Healdsburg Library (\$9500), North County Community Services (\$1400), Russian River Chamber Music Youth Programs (\$2,000), Salvation Army at Lytton Springs (\$10,400), Senior Center (\$1,000), UNICEF Haiti Relief (\$700), Fitch Mountain After School Summer Program (\$2,000).

Donations to Healdsburg schools amounted to \$133,125 over this same period. Recipients of these funds were Elementary Third Grade Dictionaries (\$11,200), Elementary School Enrichment Program (\$6740), Public School Access Team (PSST) (\$4000), Junior High School Bullying Program for 3 years (\$6000), Junior High Garden (\$1900), 8<sup>th</sup> Grade Washington DC Trip (\$3,000), Junior High School Laptop Program (\$19,000), Junior High School Library Book Club (2600), Junior High School Science Class Equipment (\$9985), Junior High School-30 Microscopes (\$12,000), Senior High School-Ceramics Oven Shelves (\$3000), Senior High School-Challenge Days-2 Years (\$5,000), Senior High School-Laptop Program (\$6500), Senior High School Scholarships for Graduating Seniors (\$51,500),

A number of communitywide projects enables the club to raise the funds that it donates back to the community. These projects include the annual Christmas Tree Sales, a labor intensive project, which uses the help of most of the membership as well as help from the Key Club, the Boy Scouts Troop 21, and the men from the Salvation Army at Lytton; the annual Pancake Breakfast held on Palm Sunday and has become a tradition for many area residents; the Food Booth at the Future Farmers Country Fair; and the Fitch Mountain Foot Race held in June. The money raised by the Foot Race is placed in the Healdsburg Memorial Scholarship Fund and the income from this fund is used for the High School scholarships awarded to graduating seniors at the award ceremonies in May. Some of the funds from the Project Fund are utilized for the scholarships.

Interesting and informative programs and speakers are the life blood of any organization and service club. During the past year, under the guidance of Dick Bugarske we've enjoyed any number of fine programs. Especially of interest lately was Kirby Bobo the instructor at the newly established Construction and Sustainability Academy at the high school and our own Kurt Hahn who gave an interesting update on the newest and innovative facilities at the Healdsburg Hospital.

This year Hunt Conrad, president-elect, will be in charge and has assembled a committee to assist him consisting of Dick Bugarske, Lucy Lewand, John Bippart, Vince Dougherty, Jerry Strong and Phil Luks.

In his presentation Kurt covered four areas : Emergency Room, Intensive Care Unit, Kozel Stroke Center and Northern California Wound Care.

He said that the newly hired team, Valley Emergency Doctors headed locally by Dr. Bruce Deas, now operate the emergency room at the hospital. They have brought new techniques along with better use of technology from portable ultra sound devices to telemedicine consults with places like Oakland's Children's Hospital.


"We handle greater acuity levels and maintain treatment in less than 30 minutes which is one of the best on the north coast," he said.

In reference to the Intensive Care Unit he said that with 24/7 intensivist support by Jim Gude and his team the quality of care for ICU patients is now top of the line.

Acceptance of the use of Syd, a telemedicine robot which not only transmits a patient friendly picture but a wide variety of diagnostic data is now viewed as a model for future ICU operations in rural and suburban settings is growing.

Healdsburg Offers in many cases, especially at night and weekends or rush hours, the best stroke care in the County. Over 80 patients have been saved and many their lives. The partnership with the California Pacific Medical Center in San Francisco means that 24 hours a day and every day within 5 minutes Healdsburg has one of the best Neurologists in the State helping to determine whether a (See page 7)

patient has a clot bleeding or other type of stroke and prescribing the appropriate treatment using telemedicine. Healdsburg has partnered with Palm Drive Hospital to have a follow up Neurologist on site who works with the patient over the subsequent months.


He added that this service would never have been possible without the generous support of the Kozel Family and the Health Care Foundation of Sonoma County.

The Healdsburg District Hospital's Annex located at 15440 Healdsburg Avenue now offers the only comprehensive wound care including HBOT (Hyperbolic Oxygen Treatment) on the north coast. This can represent a life or limb saving procedure for diabetic patients with severe leg ulcers which is a growing risk for the aging population, he added.
