

Third grade students of the Westside School proudly display the dictionaries which they received from the Kiwanis Club. Making the presentations were Dennis Stead, chairman and Bev Dordahl. 265 dictionaries were given to all third grade students in the Healdsburg area schools at a cost of \$3,172.50.

Project Budget for 2002-2003 Year of Over \$12,000 Is Approved by Board of Directors

Two major projects and two long time Kiwanis sponsored organizations will be the main recipients of the club's project fund. The budget, over \$12,000, was approved by the board of directors at its October 10 meeting. The Healdsburg Animal Shelter project to replace the dog runs has been allocated \$2,000 in addition to the \$2700 already approved last year. The additional \$2,000 was requested because of special design changes plus doors to the pens.

\$3,172.50 was allocated to the Reading First Book program in which dictionaries are distributed to all third grade students in the Healdsburg area schools including Healdsburg Elementary, Foss Creek, Fitch Mountain, Westside, Alexander Vally and St, John's Parochial School. This is the third year that the club has undertaken this well received project under the leadership of Dennis Stead. Funding for the Alexander Valley School was provided by Bob Young.

Boy Scout Troop 21, sponsored by the Kiwanis Club for many years, at the request of committee co-chairs Kurt Hahn and Neil Iversen, was allocated \$2100. And the Healdsburg High School Key Club request of \$2700 by advisor Dennis Stead was approved.

In addition the board approved a gift of \$1,000 to the American Legion Auxiliary for their 79 years of service cooking and serving lunches to the club. Because of a dwindling membership the Auxiliary, this year, advised the board that it could no longer provide this service. The Auxiliary members will be honored at the club's November 12 luncheon meeting. President Nancy Curnow, in announcing the Auxiliary's decision, remarked that it was indeed a sad occasion. Report of the Official Minutes of October 10, 2002 Board Meeting

President Nancy Curnow convened the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. in the Healdsburg Police Department. The following officers were present: President Nancy Curnow, Vice President Jerry Strong, Second Vice President Dan Maraviglia, Secretary Neil Iversen and Past President Tim Tuscany. Board Members: Fred Haley, Jim Birdsong, Rich Iverson, Yolanda Rinaldo, Todd Brandt, John Dayton and Steve Metrulas.

MINUTES: Re: the board minutes of September, 2002. President Nancy Curnow said to add the last name Gillies to Lockie Laughlin visiting our September board meeting. Fred Haley moved we accept the September 12th minutes as corrected. Jim Birdsong seconded the motion and it passed.

SECRETARY'S REPORT: Bills: All bills paid as of October 8, 2002. Dues: From September 10 to October 8 collected \$3,370 from 23 active members and 4 senior members.

OTHER NOTES: Thank you from Wheelchair Foundation for our donation of \$25 and advised us to keep all thank you reports for tax reports each year. Membership: None with 3 visits to be voted upon at the board meeting. Victoria Shipley was approved at our August 8 meeting, but not inducted as yet because of her absence from the area.

TREASURERS' REPORTS: Neither treasurer was present but the reports were examined by the board members. Fred Haley moved we accept the reports, Dan Maraviglia seconded the motion and it passed.

COMMITTEE REPORTS: Publicity: John Bippart asked about planning to get set up on the Web Site and planning to send out our newsletter on E Mail. Due to lack of members with computers the board did not act on the request of establishing a web site. Budgets: Animal Shelter Project: Due to special design changes and doors to the pens, an additional \$2000 to the \$2700 already approved was requested. Dan Maraviglia moved we add the \$2000 to give \$4700 to the Animal Shelter project. Fred Haley seconded the motion and it passed. Publications: Chairman Arnold Santucci asking for \$875 for publishing the monthly newsletter. Fred Haley moved we accept \$875 budget for the Publications Committee for 2002-2003. Tim Tuscany seconded the motion and it passed. Historical Committee: Chairman Albert (Pete) Peterson asking for \$450, same as last year, and not used. Past President Tim Tuscany moved we accept Peterson's budget of

\$450. Todd Brandt seconded the motion and it passed. Scouting: Neil Iversen/Kurt Hahn asked for \$2,090 for Scout Troop 21 for 2002-2003. Dan Maraviglia moved we accept \$2100 for scouting . Jim Birdsong seconded the motion and it passed. KEY CLUB: Advisor Dennis Stead asked for \$2700 budget. Dan Maraviglia moved we accept Stead's report and issue \$2700 for 2002-2003. Jerry Strong seconded the motion and it passed. Reading First Book Program: Dennis Stead reported planning to issue 270 dictionaries @ \$10.75 plus tax and shipping, equals \$3,172.50 budget. Jerry Strong moved we accept Dennis' budget of \$3,172.50 for 2002-2003 Todd Brandt seconded the motion and it passed. Membership: The membership committee asked for \$400- for 2002-2003. Dan Maraviglia moved we accept \$400 for the membership committee, Jim Birdsong seconded the motion and it passed.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS: Honorary Members: Past President Tim Tuscany had talked to board members at our installation about Rick Alves and Jason Liles not attending on a regular basis. It was unanimous with the board members present that they both be dropped from membership at this time. Secretary Iversen said that Honorary Members are not to be counted with our District and International Kiwanis Membership semi-annual reports each year. So deleting these two will not hurt our membership. Auxiliary: Past president Tuscany reported meeting and talking to Florence Musselman of the American Legion Auxiliary. The Ladies Auxiliary usually made \$200 a month serving the club lunch. Equals \$2400 a year. The board suggested we plan a lunch for the Auxiliary in November and issue them a check for \$1,000. Todd Brandt moved we issue \$1,000 to the Ladies Auxiliary, Jim Birdsong seconded the motion and it passed. The luncheon date is set for Tuesday, November 12 club meeting.

NEW BUSINESS: Playground Equipment: City Parks Director Peter O'Brien asked for donations to buy more playground equipment for Gibbs Park as 66% of the Fitch Mountain School and Foss Creek School play in Gibbs Park. No action taken because Gibbs Park may become a dog park should Prop. R pass in the November 5 election. Leave of Absence: Yolanda Rinaldo asked for two months leave of absence (October 10-December 8). Todd Brandt moved we accept Yolanda's leave of absence, John Dayton seconded the motion and it passed.



Budget ----

In addition the club provides 4 scholarships of \$1500 each to graduating Healdsburg High School seniors. Funding for this program comes from the income only of the Kiwanis Memorial Scholarship fund which now totals about \$80,000. Last year, however, \$2,000 was allocated from the administrative fund for this program to help with our goal of 4 scholarships at \$1500 each.

How do we raise the money for our projects? We have two major fund raisers – the Pancake Breakfast on Palm Sunday and a food booth at the Future Farmers Country Fair in May. The profits from the Fitch Mountain Footrace in June (about \$5,000 last year) are added to the Memorial Scholarship Fund to increase the income for our scholarship program.

In addition to the programs noted above the club also allocates funds to various worthy causes as they are presented to the board -- to the Boys and Girls Club, My Body Is Healthy, and other special requests involving the youth of our community.
