Our Major Fund Raising Project: Christmas Tree Lot Opens November 25; Sign Up for Shifts

Selling Christmas trees in the city owned lot next to City Hall on Grove Street—our major fund raiser — will get under way on Friday, November 25, the day after Thanksgiving. However, before that the lot will be prepared by a volunteer crew on Saturday, November 19. Post holes need to be dug, electrical wire strung and fencing erected.

Ken Scharer, chairman of this project, advised that asignment sheets will be available at Tuesday meetings and stressed the need for every member to sign up for at least three shifts. Help is especially needed on weekends. Work sessions are 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. and 3 p.m. to 7 p.m. During the week the lot will be open from 11 a.m. to 7 p.m. and on weekends from 10 a.m. to 7 p.m. Joe Engler is in charge of theassigment roster.

Tree lot managers working with Ken Scharer are Roger Dormire, Joe Engler, Guy French, Jerry Strong, Rick Norman, Dee Whitehall, Rich Thomas, LeRoy Steck, Jim Schmidt, Dennis Stead, Michael Laird, Mark Zimmerman, Richard Yates, Keith Scharer and Ron Puccioni.

1400 trees from Oregon have been ordered and the first shipment is expected to arrive on 22 or3. Last year the club grossed approximately \$82,000 from the month long sale and netted \$32,000 which went into the

club's Project Fund to be distributed to many worthy causes the club supports.

Presents Project/Adopt-A-Family, under the auspices of the Kiwanis Club, works with the Healdsburg School District, 4C's Day Care, Fitch Mountain State Pre-school, Alliance Medical Center, and the Healdsburg Boys and Girls Club to identify the families in need.

The Project's aim is to make certain that families with children not only receive needed items but also gifts from a personal wish list. The coordinators of the project said that the program succeeds, in part, because it provides sponsors with an opportunity to provide real and meaningful gifts to an entire family.

Groups, businesses, employee groups and individuals can Adopt-A-Family. 
Salvation Army Can Use Your Help

the dictionaries, beautifully illustrated and with many photographs, contains 960 pages. Each book contains a book plate explaining that the book was donated by the Kiwanis Club plus it has a space for the recipient's name. In addition, a book marker, explaining who and what Kiwanis is, in both English and Spanish, is inserted in the book. Each third grader may keep the dictionary at school or may take it home. The program was named the First Book Project because, many times, it is the first book that child has owned.

Dennis estimated that over the ten years the Kiwanis Club has supplied dictionaries to the third grade students the club has spent approximately \$33,000 on this project. 226 books were distributed this year.

Crowded and Busy Agenda at First Meeting of New Governing Board

With fourteen items on the agenda, the first meeting of the new governing board took a little longer than the one hour planned by new president Hunt Conrad

Eight of the fourteen requests were approved with others refused or tabled for more information.

A request from the North County Community Services for \$153.36 to repair the heater or replace it located at St. Paul's Episcopal Church's Spare Room (an overnight shelter for homeless) was approved

Approved was a grant of \$2007 requested by The North Bay Association of Realtors. The payment was deferred until January,2012 when more Project Funds become available. This grant will be divided unequally among several organizations such as the Boys and Girls Club and Meals on Wheels.

\$100 was approved for payment to the Kiwanis Family House at the University of California at Davis Medical Center, Sacramento in memory of long time Kiwanis member Temple Smith.

Also approved was a \$100 grant request from the Healdsburg Rotary Sunrise Club who is sponsoring a patriotic breakfast on Veterans Day.

A gift certificate for a Christmas Tree (not to exceed 8 feet) for the Healdsburg Rotary Club's annual crab feed was approved;

\$100 was a[[proved as a grant to the Cloverdale Kiwanis Club to help with the Cloverdale Marathon conducted on Sunday, November 23

A \$1000 Kiwanis Teen Key Leadership program was approved. This grant is refundable if not enough teens sign up for the program and the program fails to be implemented.

Division 32 Lt. Governor Del Avante \$15 per club member grant request. \$900 was approved as a payment to help the Lt. Governor pay his travel and administrative expenses for the fiscal year.

\$905 for insurance premiums was approved, \$755 for directors and officers liability plus \$150 for crime insurance, payable if club money or property is stolen by a club member.

An administrative leave of absence was granted to David Jones for six months and to Richard Thomas for three months.

In other business, the board tabled a request from the Boys and Girls Club for \$2500 to be used to upgrade the game room i.e. tables, chairs, computer, paint, etc. The board felt the request should be explained and discussed at a lunch time meeting of the membership. Also it was felt that the club needs a quarantee that the money (Please see page 5)

would be fully spent at the Healdsburg Boys and Girls Club and not sent to the Boys and Girls Club of Central Sonoma County.



Not acceptable to the board was a request that the Healdsburg Club hosts the Governor's annual dinner..(Albert (Pete)Peterson contributed to this article).




