Report Good Start On Christmas Trees Sales

Ken Scharer, chairman of the fourth annual Christmas Trees Sale, told the membership on Tuesday November 28 that the project "had a decent start" and that the first four days of the sale "brought in \$9500". The sales for the opening day, Friday, November 24, reportedly came to \$4,000 and Saturday about \$3,000 Ken advised.

The club has ordered 1500 trees from Oregon, 200 less than last year, with three deliveries planned. The first shipment arrived on November 23 and the second on November 29. A third load will be brought in in another week or so to maintain a good selection of trees for our clientle.

Ken said that this year we will have a few more days to sell pointing out "we will have four weeks and a few days" because of Christmas falling on Monday.

Joe Engler, in charge of the volunteers, reminded the membership that everyone needs to put in at least three shifts . A.M. shifts run from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. on weekdays and 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. on weekends. P.M. shifts start at 3 p.m. and end at 8 p.m. He urged members to donate more time to this project and to drop in from time to time. There are more openings for the P. M. shift. Spouses are also asked to help especially with cashiering. Kelly Brewer again is on hand to help the club operate this project. Also helping on the weekend are men from the Salvation Army's ARC Lytton facility. Boy Scouts and Key Club members are also offering assistance.

The tree lot is located on Grove Street, just north of the Healdsburg City Hall. Kiwanians cleaned and prepared the lot on Saturday, November 18.

Board Approves Sponsorship of Fair Parade

At its November 9 meeting the Kiwanis governing board approved an expenditure of \$5,300 to sponsor the 2007 Future Farmers Country Fair Twilight Parade which opens the 3 day annual Future Farmers Country Fair held at Recreation Park. A letter from the Fair Board to the Kiwanis Club indicated the Fair is having financial problems and is seeking help from the community. The Kiwanis board also requested that the flyers advertising the parade indicate that the parade is "sponsored by the Kiwanis Club."

In other business the board approved a donation of \$2500 to the Healdsburg High School for the purchase of new chairs.



Net Street Dance Funds Donated to Boys, Girls Club

Dennis Stead advised the club at the November 28 meeting that the August Street Dance sponsored by the club and the Boys and Girls Club took in \$20,914. After operating expenses the net came to \$4,169. Of that \$2,000 was donated to the Healdsburg Boys and Girls Club.

The Kiwanis Club took over operating the street dance from the Boys and Girls Club when the Boys and Girls Club advised that it could no longer operate the project.

Thousands of local and area residents as well as visitors attended the dance held on Healdsburg Avenue between Matheson and Plaza Streets. Many Kiwanians spent many hours working on this project.
