During World War II he served as a Naval officer and following his discharge returned to Healdsburg . He operated the family business, Rosenberg and Bush Department store, until it was sold and then joined Mid-Towne Realty where he remained for about ten years prior to retirement.

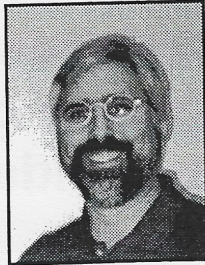
I get more excited by activity within the club each month as I am president. I have the unique perspective of seeing the whole picture. We have a very active membership in comparison to other clubs within our Division.

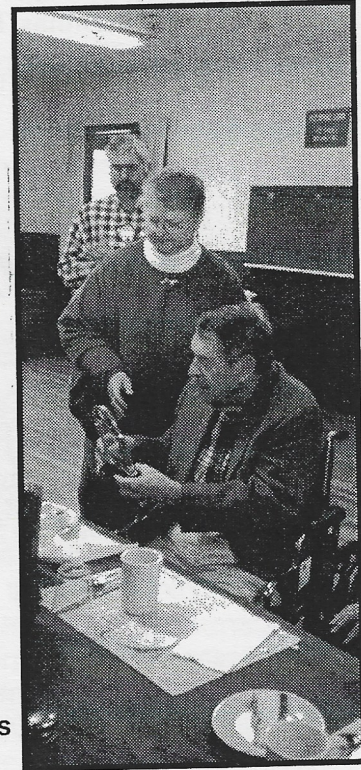
