It is on "Honest Abe" we dwell to day - this 14th day of February, 1939, one hundred and thirty years plus two days ago Abraham Lincoln was born.

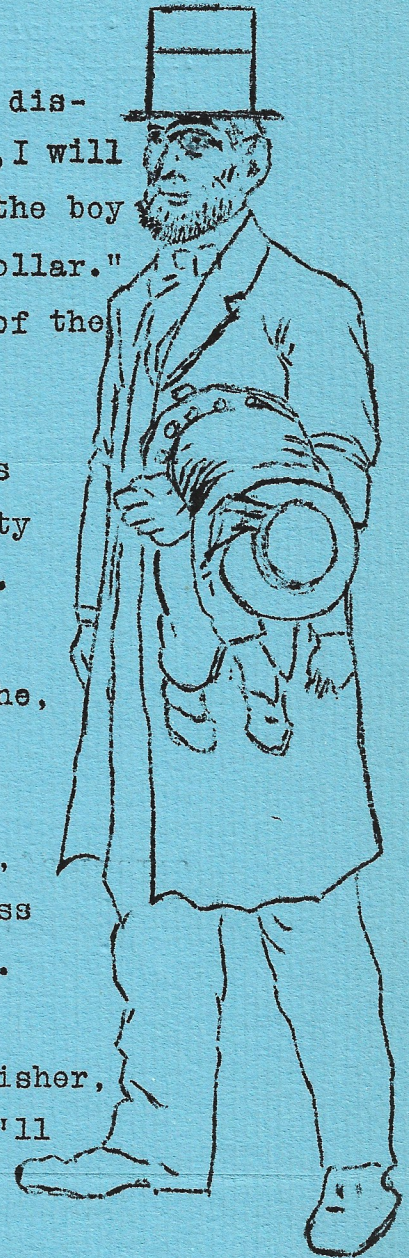
Your chairman, Ed. Quinn by name, yes, even he, wonders just what type of program it is to be.
