

Ad and Ticket Sales and Generous Sponsors Will Make Pancake Breakfast Another Winner

The club's second most important fundraiser, the Pancake Breakfast set for Sunday, March 16 is "ready to go", according to Pancake Chairman Rick Norman. The assignmens for that day have been issued to club members. If you have not received yours, contact Rick Norman. Rick emphasized that if you can not be at your assigned task at your assigned time to contact him immediately so he can make the proper adjustment. Rick said please do not wait until March 16 to advise that you can not be on board as scheduled. Serving hours are from 7:30 a.m. to 1 p.m. First shift starts at 6:30 a.m., second shift at 9 a.m. and third at 11:30 a.m.

Tickets for the breakfast, the 52nd annual, are \$7 for adults and \$4 for children. Each member, he stressed, is responsible for 10 tickets. — buy them or sell them. Our club is hosting the official visit of the Governor to Division 32 for the second year in a row and was chosen because of the fine job we did last year, as explained by Club President George Diebold.


Help Kiwanis House at Arco Arena
