



Bill Kassin will take a few minutes off from his busy day, as a car salesman, to be program chairman, today. He will bring "bud" Davis as speaker. Mr. Davis is from the Siskiyou Flying Service, the company which contracts to provide the big aerial tankers used in fighting fires. "Siskiyou" not only provides the tankers used in the North Coast but is involved all over the United States and in foreign countries in fire fighting.

Last week our six visitors were all from Geyserville Kiwanis. President Ron Johnson brought with him, Pat Patterson, John Soule, Charlie Gardner, Harry Bosworth and Frank Cinalli to promote Saturday's Corn Beef and Cabbage Feed, as well as for an Inter-club.

Speaker of the day was "Reg" Elgin, a former Healdsburg young man, now Student Placement and Financial Aids Officer at Santa Rosa Junior College. Reg has been director of the California Inter Tribal Council and had a White House appointment as one of the negotiators working upon the Wounded Knee problem. While now working full time at the Junior College, Reg is still vitally interested in the problems of Native Americans who form our countries most deprived ethnie group. There are about 700,000 Indians in the United States, one third of whom live in California. Statistically, Native Americans have greater poverty, more illness, less education, more alcoholism, and a shorter life span than any other minority in the United States. Those conditions will improve when we forget our stereo-typed ideas of Indians and learn to live together as people who respect each other. Reg gave us something to think about when he mentioned the idea of a Kiwanis Scholarship to be given to a needy student attending Santa Rosa Junior College.

Hank Spomer presented to Byron Gibbs, in absentia, a Certificate of Appreciation for his services for eight years as a member of the Sonoma County Civil Service Commission and announced that Bud Christensen will now represent this area on that commission.

President Fran announced that the nominating committee will consist of Gerry Miller, Walt Wright, Waldo Iversen and Ken Gonsalves. Time passes --- it seems that we just had the installation of this year's officers a night or two ago.

Some signed up for the Basketball Dinner work crew on March 26th. There is still room for more help.


