No Fooling ! 56th Pancake Day Set For Sunday, April 1. Chairman Says 'Sell Those Tickets'

Only five weeks away, Bob Taylor, general chairman of the annual Pancake Breakfast—our 56th—reminds the members to sell at least the ten tickets which he has distributed during the past week. Each member is responsible to buy or sell the ten tickets to the breakfast, our second largest fund raiser, set for Sunday, April 1 at the Villa Chanticleer. If you have not received your tickets yet you should get in touch with Bob Taylor at 894-0857 or e mail him at chiefhd@aol.com.

He said that the assignment sheets detailing time of service and in which capacity will be available shortly. If you can not serve on that day please notify Bob at once so he can make other arrangements.

During this period prior to the event the 11 member advertising committee, headed by Dick Bugarske who took over from Rich Iverson last year will be calling on Healdsburg area business to solicit ads for the double truck promotional piece which will appear in the *Healdsburg Tribune* the Thursday prior to April 1.

In an e mail interview Dick said that last year "we published 96 ads bringing around a gross of \$7,000, netting about \$5 to \$6 thousand from the ad each year. Some business, he added, donated more money than the ad cost and some have traditionally donated products to the event such as McDonald's etc.

Dick added It is our second largest fundraiser of the year, netting approximately \$12,000 a year for our club with over 200 businesses and community members taking part.

He concluded: "Healdsburg Kiwanis serving pancakes and the youth of Healdsburg for 56 years !"

Joining Bob Taylor and Dick Bugarske as Pancake Breakfast chairs is Bob Santucci who is in charge of the kitchen operation.

Kiwanis International Eliminate Project

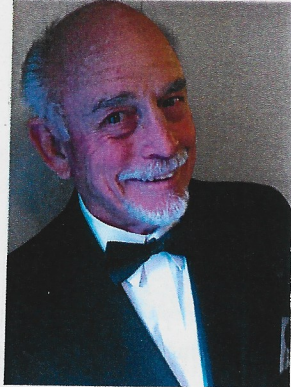
Past Lt. Governor of Division 32, Richard Fuller of Windsor, reminded the club members Tuesday evening that Kiwanis International's project and goal is to eliminate maternal and neonatal tetanus. Statistics show that MNT kills one baby every nine minutes. However, three doses of a 60-cent vaccine can protect babies and mothers too.

Kiwanis International and UNICEF have become partners to bring this vaccine to 40 countries, eliminating MNT from the face of the earth by 2015. The goal is to raise \$110 million dollars to complete this project. Kiwanis' role is to provide the funds for the vaccine only.

Lt. Governor Rick who is serving on the Eliminate board on the District level emphasized the need for all clubs to participate by letting the community know of the program and its goals. Loretta Strong who was president of our club when the program was initiated is the club's representative in the program.

Key Club Valentine's Day Bake Sale Funds Will Go for Leadership Program

Auctioneer Dennis Stead made certain that the Kiwanis Club members "came through" for the Key Club when he conducted the annual Key Club bake sale on Valentine's Day.

The Kiwanis members were "generous" in bidding on and purchasing the cakes, pie, cookies and a variety of muffins. According to Kiwanis Key Club committee chairman, Andy Smith, the auction raised \$540. He said the funds will be used to offset the costs of Key Clubbers attending the Key Leader training Conference scheduled for March 22-25 at the Alliance Redwoods in Occidental.

Key Leader is a leadership experience for today's youth leaders. It focuses on service leadership as the first, most meaningful experience. A Key Leader learns the most important lesson of leadership i.e. leadership comes from helping others succeed.

The Status of the Club Was Under Discussion at Monthly Board Meet

One request for a donation, a request for a change in membership status and a request for membership were among the items approved by the board of directors at their monthly meeting held Thursday, February 16 in the Conference Room at the Healdsburg Fire Station.

President Hunt opened the meeting by stating that he is pleased with the status of the club as regards its ongoing membership status, its financial health and meeting our goals of helping Healdsburg's youth and Healdsburg in general.

Board members agreed although no appropriate background applause or music was heard.

\$200 was approved to help offset the operational cost of the Healdsburg Area Science Fair.

Ron Doble's request to change his status from regular member to associate member was approved. Ron has not been able to attend Tuesday noon meetings on a regular basis due to business constraints.

A request for membership by Debbi Doble will be forwarded to the Membership Committee for action.

The board was advised that Jerry Strong, a past president, is an entrant in the Mr. Healdsburg Contest, a fundraiser for the Raven Theatre. All club members were encouraged to support him in this endeavor. The "hat" was passed at the February 21 meeting and \$122 was raised. These funds will be counted as points in judging the contest.

It was again noted that the Administrative Fund's financial health is strong. Treasurer Peterson suggested an "Operational Reserve" be created of approximately \$15,000 as a buffer against possible revenue decreases. He also opined that such a decision should be made by club members at the club's annual meeting. This item was tabled for future board discussion.

Regarding online financial data storage Treasurer Peterson observed that the club's Financial Review Committee in its report to the board, made a suggestion that the club's financial records should be stored "on line", in addition to the treasurer's personal filing system, so that they would be readily available in the event that the club treasurer's computer would sustain a failure or be incapacitated.

Options were discussed such as utilizing a professional on line data storage company which can update club records daily, or at a minimum, E-mailing records at least once a month to a club established E-mail depository.

At least one other club member, such as the club secretary, would have possession of our "user ID" and "Password" to facilitate access to stored club records if necessary.

Pete suggested that only financial accumulation records be retained on-line such as monthly financial reports, check registers and member dues spreadsheets. On-line retention of other files such as Grant Letters or Member Status Letters may not be critical to ensuring financial accessibility.

This goal was agreed to and Pete will develop a more precise alternative for the next board meeting. This item was tabled for future consideration.

Dewitt Family Bequest To Kiwanis Memorial Scholarship Fund Clarified

In the early announcement that the Healdsburg Kiwanis Scholarship Fund was the recipient of a donation from the Dewitt family trust it was believed that the bequest could be in the six figures category. However, the amount that will be received by the club's Memorial Scholarship Fund was more in the five figure category.

Charles Reichel, treasurer of the Memorial Scholarship Fund, advised the members at the February 7 meeting that the amount would be 20 percent of the Dewitt funds donated to charities.

He said that the amount which would be deposited in the Memorial Scholarship Fund would be between \$50,000 and \$60,000.

This, he said, "would be equivalent to 10 Fitch Mountain Foot Race fundraisers."

During the past years the net income from the Fitch Mountain Foot Race has been designated for the Memorial Scholarship Fund, helping it to grow about \$5,000 to \$6,000 a year. Income from the Fund helps to pay for scholarships presented to Healdsburg High School graduates.

John Bippart Second Lotto Winner

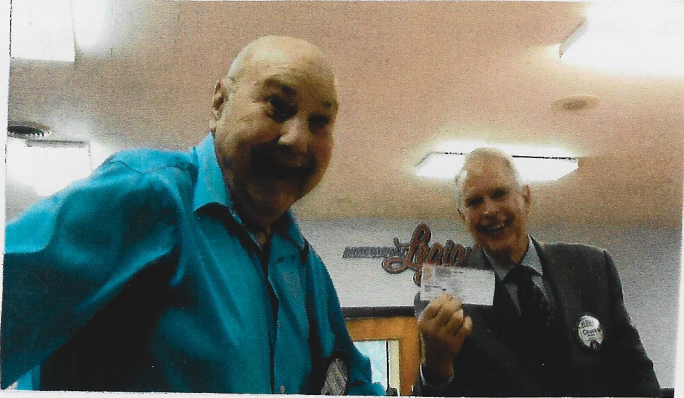
Buying \$5 worth of Lotto tickets at the February 21 meeting brought him an excellent return on his investment.

Neo-Energetics and Veterans' Remains Are Topics at the March Noon Meetings

Interesting and unusual topics will be under discussion at the March meetings.

On Tuesday, March 6 Mo McElroy, president of the Healdsburg Chamber of Commerce, will be the guest speaker. She will bring us up to date on the move to new offices for the Chamber at the H2 Hotel site. McElroy who came here from her long time assignment with the Santa Rosa Convention and Visitors Bureau, took over her duties with the Healdsburg Chamber a little over a year ago.

Following McElroy on Tuesday, March 13 the guest speaker will be Neo-Energetics educator Captain David Pottinger, author of *Wake of the Mystic*. As a student of metaphysics he has created *Neo-Energetics*, "a formula that illustrates and demonstrates the transformation of energy from the invisible realm of consciousness to the five-sensory visible realm of your personal reality."

Ron Collier, retired Fire Chief of the Windsor Fire Protection District, will speak to the members on March 20 as the Sonoma County Veterans Remains Officer. He was appointed by the board of supervisors to the new post last year formed under AB 1644 signed into law on August 27, 2010. The law formalized "the requirements for a Veterans' Remains Organization. The new code establishes procedures so that all unclaimed remains of veterans and veterans dependents could be identified and designated to a veterans' organization for proper burial."

The program for March 27 will feature Eagle Scout Jamison McKay and members of Kiwanis sponsored Troop 21.

Treasurer's Report Reaffirms the Club's Financial Status Is Healthy

Reporting to the members of the board and to the membership at large, Treasurer Pete Peterson's cash flow reports for both the Administrative Fund and the Project Fund reflects a "healthy" status.

At the February board of directors meeting President Hunt Conrad remarked that he was pleased "with the status of the club as regards its ongoing membership status, its financial health and meeting our goals of helping Healdsburg's youth and Healdsburg in general". (See full financial reports in this issue of the Builder).

The reports show that club members participated in four fund raising event Food Booth at Future Farmers Country Fair, the annual Pancake Breakfast, the Sale of Christmas Trees (our biggest fund raiser) Funds raised by the Fitch Mountain Foot Race are placed in the Healdsburg Kiwanis Memorial Scholarship Fund, with the income used for scholarships at the high school.

The cash flow at the end of September 2011 came to \$57,300. The club expenditures came to \$55,819 with donations going to youth organizations, schools and scholarships. \$12,500 was a final payment for the grandstand renovation at Recreation Park and \$15,000 for scholarships for high school graduates. Total Project Funds as of September 30, 2011 came to \$40,776.

The Administrative Fund Cash Flow shows a good balance in the account with a cash flow amount of \$67,512 as of October 1, 2011. Income came from dues – regular, associate and senior – as well as from the annual barbecue at Brandt's Beach and the gold tournament at Windsor Golf Course.

Expenses besides the catered lunches are dues to Kiwanis International, dues to Cal-Nev-Ha District and Kiwanis Division 32, Other expenses are rent for the Villa Annex and insurance coverage plus miscellaneous items. Total expenditures came to \$44,245 leaving a balance of \$23,267.

Journalism Class Receives Gift of New Digital Camera from Past President

Because of a lapse in communications a request to the board of directors for a grant to purchase a new digital camera for the high school's Journalism class, past president Dick Bugarske stepped up and offered to use part of his President's Fund. \$300 was given to Journalism instructor Camille Lehrmann to buy a camera for the class to use in its production of the school's newspaper, *the Hound's Bark*.

In the original request it was assumed the funding would come out of the club's project fund. To rectify the mishap Dick graciously offered and seemed pleased to pay for the request.
