NOTICE! NOTICE!

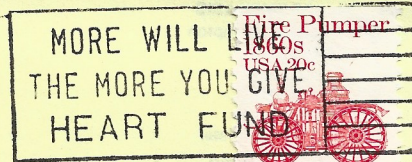
