Also participating was the West Side School where Healdsburg Police Chief Kevin Burke and Healdsburg Fire Chief Steve Adams read to the classes. Chris Love, Healdsburg Tribune columnist, coordinated the event for the second year.

Board Approves Funding for Annual Scholarships, \$1700 To Kiwanis Int'l Eliminate Project

The board of directors at its March 17 meeting approved an allocation of \$15,000 -- \$10,000 from the Project Fund and \$5,000 from the Healdsburg Memorial Scholarship Fund — for this year's scholarships presented to graduating Healdsburg High School seniors. The Scholarship Awards Committee chaired by Loretta Strong met on Tuesday, March 29 to cull through the applications and pick ten from which the awardees will be chosen. Twenty-one applications were received. The Awards Committee composed of Loretta Strong, chair, Pete Peterson, Dick Bugarske, Jerry Strong, Lee Gunnerson and Arnold Santucci will decide how the funds will be allocated and how many scholarships will be presented at Awards Night at the high school in May.

In other business, the board donated \$1700 to the Eliminate Project which is a Kiwanis International/UNICEF project to eliminate Maternal Neonatal Tetanus. The \$1700, the President's Charity Fund, was accumulated during past president Loretta Strong's term which ended September 20, 2010.

\$500 was approved for the Cypress String Quartet sponsored by the Russian River Chamber Music for performances at Healdsburg schools. 400 students attended the recital.

Also approved was a fee of \$125 for the young Irish Dancers who performed at the club's March 22

evening meeting plus a \$15 gift certificate at Copperfield's Book Store for each of the six dancers.

A \$500 grant request from the Sonoma County Science Olympiad was tabled because insufficient Healdsburg students are participating.

The club's Crime/Theft Insurance coverage was increased to \$50,000 from \$25,000. Deductible was also increased from \$500 to \$1,000.

\$750 in premium cost for Directors and Officers Liability Insurance plus \$200 in premium cost for Worker Compensation Insurance were transferred from the Administrative Fund to the Project Fund. As Treasurer Pete Peterson pointed out these two liability items are more likely to occur in fund raising projects rather than in Administrative Fund operations.

Dual signatures on club checks as a financial security issue had some operational questions and was tabled.

A Proposed Project Fund Budget for the year ending September 30, 2011 based on the Membership Budget Allocation Survey of several years ago, was discussed. The conclusion was that this report was useful, informative, should be entitled something along the line of "Project Fund Spending Guideline" and should be reported to the board at least quarterly.

Kelley Pafford's resignation was accepted with regret. She lives and works in Santa Rosa and time involved to attend club meetings and fund raising activities is not realistic at this time.(Albert (Pete) Peterson contributed to this article).

The booth needs to be set up and in place by Thursday, May 26 by 2 p.m. The menu, it was decided, would not change and would feature, again, hot dogs, Polish dogs, garlic fries, sodas and bottled water. Dennis will put together a crew to clean up all the equipment, utensils and food trailer and to dispose of the old cooking oil and grease prior to the event. A new plan is to have one person in charge of the "condiment table" at all times to keep it clean and stocked.

The next big event, the annual barbecue and auction at Brandt's Beach, has been set for Saturday, August 27. Money raised from this event goes to the Administrative fund. Charlie Palmer, of the Dry Creek Kitchen, again will be asked to be the Celebrity Chef for the night. If he is not available the committee will ask Jeff Mall of Zin's Restaurant to do the honors.


This year tickets will be sold prior to the dinner and the number will be limited to 120. The menu will remain the same as last year — steak, corn-on-the-cob, chili, rolls, salad and dessert. Chicken will be provided for those who do not eat red meat. 20 cases of wine will be supplied by Rich Thomas. The wine is from county wide tasting events in which Rich is involved, can not be sold and is to be used only for club events.

Vince Dougherty, Chris Metrulas and Bob Santucci will head up the kitchen crew. Bob also agreed to talk to the new owners of the Party Store to ascertain if the club can get a discount on linens, place settings, etc.

Lucy Lewand has volunteered to be in charge of the silent auction.
