

Despite the economic downturn , the Healdsburg business commmunity again responed to the club's request by buying over \$5,000 worth of advertising for the 53rd annual Pancake Day., Sunday, April 5.

Loretta Strong, Pancake Day chairperson and Richard Iverson, advertising committee chairman, said that the advertising committee's efforts paid off to the tune of over \$5,000, a little less than last year's. A few business people opted not to advertise with us this year. However, the committee salespersons were able to pick up a few new ones. Advertising Committee members helping to sell were Carl Elze, Chris Metrulas, Don Marshall, Martin Silge, Roger Dormire, George Clough, Jack Brandt, Dick Bertapelle, Dennis Stead, Phil Luks, Arnold Santucci and Richard Iverson.

In addtion, to assure that this year's Pancake Day, one of our major fund raisers , would be a financial success, Loretta was able to muster 18 Kiwanians to pledge approximately \$2,000 to offset the basic costs of running the event , a tradition started by last year's Pancake Day chairman, Rick Norman. Last year the club netted \$13,195 for the project fund.

Financial Status Presented To Board

As reported in the April 8 Minutes by Secretary Phil Luks

Mr (Al) Peterson presented the March 31, 2009 Treasurer's report. On a going forward basis, the administrative fund has approximately \$9,300 on hand or estimated from dues, and a projected \$12,875 outflow over the next several months. , including the \$7,400 international dues payment.

Mr. Peterson reported that the net profit from the Pancake Breakfast is \$12,875. Cash available for project spending was \$69,814 of which \$29,6671 is available assuming the membership's recommended allocations are followed.

Mr. Peterson brought up the club's approach to High School scholarships for 2009. He pointed out the meeting Mr. Luks and he had with Messers Reichel and Maraviglia and Mr. Maraviglia's subsequent letter, which indicated that the Scholarship Fund had decided to make no scholarships for 2009, but to rebuild corpus, in light of recent investment shortfalls.


In other business, Mr. Gary brought up Robert Young, our district trustee, and his request for a \$2 per member travel reimbursement. No motion was made on this issue.

Mr. Gary brought up discussion with Mr. Stewart, of the Tayman Park Golf Course, who offered his facility for the club's weekly lunches, at a cost of \$75 per meeting, compared to the \$110 per meeting which will be charged by the Villa in July. It was agreed that Mr. Gary should discuss this move with the membership at a lunch meeting.

In Memoriam:

A Tribute To Neil Iversen



The March 31 meeting of the Kiwanis Club was opened with the Boy Scouts Prayer in memory of Neil Iversen who died on his birthday, March 27 at his Healdsburg home at the age of 72.

The official scouts' prayer was read by past president Vince Dougherty. His brother Dale Iversen advised that Neil did not want a memorial service and that he wished the Community Dinner sponsored by the Kiwanis Club last year in which he was honored as a lasting memorial. Neil Iversen was a past president and for five years served as secretary receiving a special award from the Kianis Lt. Governor for his services to the Division 32.

Neil, a graduate of Healdsburg High School. was a third generation Kiwanis member and worked for the City of Healdsburg for 45 years. Kurt Hahn, a fellow Kiwanian and chairman of the Neil Iversen Recognition Dinner held April 18, 2008, described Neil "as a genuine local hero noting that he had worked for the City of Healdsburg for 45 years in which he was the eyes and ears of management often reporting potential problems before they became serious."

Known as "Healdsburg's Mr. Scouting" he served as an adult scout leader for Troop 21 for over 50 years following in the footsteps of his father Waldo Iversen. He witnessed many scouts reach the rank of Eagle Scout as did he.

Neil is survived by his 99 year old mother Evelyn Day Iversen, his brother Dale Iversen of Santa Rosa and numerous nieces and nephews.

Board Meetings

Funding Was Approved For Education Foundation, Boosters

A request from the Healdsburg Education Foundation for \$10,000 to \$15,000 for the computer room and new computers at the Healdsburg Junior High School presented at the board's February meeting was approved with the stipulation that the funding be split and matched by the HEF. It was approved that two separate and consecutive "one for one" challenge grants be spent on computer acquisition, each for \$5,000.

At the March 11 meeting, Kim Thompson of the Healdsburg Athletic Boosters advised that the Boosters has taken over the sponsorship of "Healdsburg Night at the Giants" scheduled for June 15. The event will raise money for the Healdsburg High School athletic teams. Thompson asked that the club sponsor the cost of one bus at \$1,000. However, the board opted to help underwrite a bus to the extent of \$500.

In other business, secretary Phil Luks advised the board that it had been some time since the club reviewed its bylaws. He distributed a draft of the current national Kiwanis Club approved by laws together with a memorandum which discussed how choices could be made within approved alternatives to conform that draft to current club practices. Board members discussed provisions dealing with the separation of project and administrative funds and the potential for creating two-year, rather than one-year, officers terms. The suggestion was taken under advisement.

Board member Hunt Conrad suggested that the club pursue a softball game with the Rotary Clubs, as a fund raising event. After discussion, the board approved Hunt's continuing efforts to organize a game.

No Dessert and Save a Buck!

It was a slam dunk !!

The club members, with a show of hands, opted to forego dessert at the weekly luncheon meeting so that the weekly tab would not be raised.

The governing board had been advised by the caterers that they would have to raise the cost of the weekly luncheon by \$1 because of rising costs. The suggested increase would cost the club approximately \$2500 a year. However, if the club members decided they could do without dessert, the luncheon fee would not be increased.

By a show of hands the members, at the March 31 meeting, unanimously indicated that they did not need dessert and would rather save a dollar a week.
