It was agreed, too, that because Memorial Day falls on Tuesday our weekly meet will take place of the next day, Wednesday. Remember this.


SECOND ANNOUNCEMENT: Frankic is coming. Here next Tuesday, 16th. An outstanding program this will be. The one and only FRANKIE.
