Fitch Mountain Footrace Sunday, June 8; Traffic Monitors Play A Very Important Role



Final plans for the annual Fitch Mountain Footrace have been made and club members who have been assigned specific jobs are urged to make every effort to participate. If you can not participate please make certain that a committee member is so advised. Contact either co-chairs Dan Maraviglia or Lee Gunnerson or Joe Engler or Jerry Strong.

Joe Engler has issued the assignments for the race and a copy of the assignments is printed in this issue of The Builder. Engler pointed out that "this event is a major fundraiser for the club (the proceeds go to the Healdsburg Kiwanis Memorial Scholarship Fund). It is important for the club and the runners that the event be carried out successfully, he advised.

One of the most important duties for the sponsor is to provide safety for the runners, he stressed. That is why there is a traffic monitor at each intersection along the race course.

The race will start at 8 a.m. from the Plaza Square with registration starting at 7 a.m. All traffic monitors are asked to be at their station by 7:30 a.m. and to wear red vests which will be provided.

The race consists of a combined 10K run and 3K run and or walk courses. There are 10 age divisions in the 10K race and 11 divisions in the 3 K course. First place winners in each category will receive special hand cast medallions and all registered runners will receive a commemorative T-shirt. Pre-registration fees are \$20 for adults and \$15 for children under 12 and seniors. Race day registration fees are \$25 for adults and \$20 for children and seniors.

Food Booth Was A Big Winner At the Fair

Last year's sales at the Future Farmers Country Fair food booth amounted to \$3,800. This year \$6,700. Our two new food items, Garlic Fries and Corn Dogs, made the difference.

Thanks to the 32 volunteers who manned the booth, cooking the hot dogs, polish sausages, corn dogs and garlic fries and those who helped to serve the many customers. A special thanks to Chris Metrulas and Ken Scharer.

The net proceeds last year came to \$2,800. This year the estimated net will be \$5,000 which includes \$228 from the Kettle Korn concession next to our booth.

Here is a comparison of the 2002 sales figures with this year's results: In 2002 Thursday's sales were \$1,409, this year's \$1,727; Friday's sales last year \$1,240 and this year \$2,587. Saturday's sales in 2002 were \$1,229 and this year, \$2,169. Corn Dogs brought in \$1,064 and we sold 510 pounds of garlic fries.! 3 Healdsburg High School Seniors Are the Recipients of Memorial Scholarship Awards

Crystal Silva, one of the three winners of the Healdsburg Kiwanis Memorial Scholarship awards, was presented to the members of the club at the May 27 meeting by Tom Rackerby, chairman of the Scholarship Award committee. The other recipients, Dan Rotlisberger and Cristina Avila, were not able to be present.

The scholarships, \$1,000 each, were presented officially by President Nancy Curnow to the three awardees at the Healdsburg High School Awards Ceremony on May 19.

Crystal Silva, daughter of Holly and Mark Silva of Healdsburg, earned a 3.769 grade point average. During her high school years she participated in varsity swimming, was president of the Key Club, J.V. soccer and was active in her Church Youth Group. Her community service included mission trips, the mentor program, Christmas baskets and serving of the free meals.

She plans to attend UC at Santa Barbara and will major in marine biology. Following graduation she plans to apply to the Federal Bureau of Investigation training academy. Crystal also received a \$1,000 Governor's Scholarship.

Cristina Avila, daughter of Eufracia and Octavio Avila, has a 3.302 grade point average and plans to attend Sacramento State University where she will major in Criminal Justice.

During her high school career Cristina belonged to the Latinos Unidos Club, volunteered at the Healdsburg General Hospital, took part in the Social Advocates for Youth program and made the principal's honor roll in her Junior and Senior years.

Dan Rottisberger, grandson of Sharon and Dan Rottisberger, of Alexander Valley, has a grade point average of 3.561. He has been very active in the Future Farmers of America and the North American Fishing club. He will attend UC Davis where he will major in Viticulture and Enology. He plans to become a winemaker and to own his own small winery.

28 applications were received and all but eight were eliminated. Screening of the formal applications was done by Clarence Ruonavaara, Rich Lehrmann and Arnold Santucci. The eight finalists were interviewed by Tom Rackerby, Michael Laird, Hugo Bauer and Arnold Santucci. The criteria includes grade point average, school activities, community involvement, job history and travel. The funding for the awards comes from the Memorial Scholarship Fund and only the income from the fund can be used for the scholarships.


