Continuing with Kiwanis International Major Emphasis Program, Woodley Frampton has arranged for our own Dr. James "Jim" Gentry as our speaker today, whose subject will be SPINAL HYGIENE.

LAST WEEK'S PROGRAM & MEETING:

Woodley Frampton, major emphasis chairman, presented Steve Jarvis, DDS, who gave us an extremely interesting update regarding dental hygiene (This is the fifth health talk in your Major Emphasis Program--Dentistry). Dr. Jarvis pointed out that just brushing the teeth daily is only part of the correct dental care that should be followed. Elimination of the bacteria from the gum and teeth that eat away the soft enamel, is the important consideration. He recommended use of Sodium Bicarbonate (make a paste in the palm of the hand and brush with it) or rinsing with hydrogen peroxide can destroy the bacteria inhabitants of the mouth flora. So not to offend "Mr. Colgate", a toothpaste containing flouride has been effective to promote healthy teeth, as well as, the flushing action of the Water-Pik.
