Not the least was the massed chorus of 400 plus Kiwanians from Clubs of the California-Nevada-Hawaii District that sang on Sunday evening, June 17th. Our Club was well represented by 6 of our members: TOM BEAHM, JERRY MILLER, GARY ROSENBERG, WALT WRIGHT, RELZY AIKIN and myself.

It was a very inspirational and educational convention lasting for four and a half days. The first three mornings, our District held a caucus from 7:45 to 9:00 A.M.; before the opening of the general convention sessions. Tuesday afternoon and evening were the only free times available.

Attendance at this Convention broke the previous record at New York City in 1953 by more than 2,000. Total registration at San Francisco was 13,797; of which 2,041 were junior guests and children and 2,000 were ladies. Our California-Nevada-Hawaii District had a total of 4,638 registered.
