Our Involvement With Communty Projects Spans Many Years; the Latest with the Nursery School

Since its inception 83 years ago being involved with the community, children and special projects has been the number one priority of the Healdsburg Kiwanis Club starting with the Salvation Army's facility at Lytton when it was a home for boys and girls. A number of very special projects have occupied the services of our members during the past 20 years. Among the memorable projects in which we have participated or spearheaded are cleaning up, remodeling and building new dog runs at the Healdsburg Animal Shelter; the purchase of a trailer and its renovation as a Teen Center at the Boys and Grls Club site; and the donation of \$25,000 for the refurbishing of the grandstand at Recration Park; the refurbishing and painting of the bleachers at Recreation Park as a part of Kiwanis One Day; the cleaning up of the old and historic part of Oak Mound Cemetery; the planting of trees at the original Fitch Mountain School site. The latest Community Project is partnering with the Healdsburg Community Nursery School, a building, as president Dick Bugarske noted ."steeped in great Healdsburg history." (A number of our members recall attending kindergarten in that building): this involved donating a \$2600 matching grant for a new roof plus our members taking on the onerous task of removing the very old ceiling and then painting the new professionally installed sheetrock ceiling. The club contributed \$1400 to this part of the project.

Removing the old ceiling, estimated to be at least 70 years olf, was a very dirty job said Rick Norman, in charge of the project. The workers were

supplied with covers=alls, caps, face masks and gloves by the Nursery School personnel.

This was a cooperative venture with the Community Nursery School. The club supplied funds for the new roof and the new ceiling and parents of the Nursery School offered to help with Kiwanis Club projects. A number of them assisted serving at the Future Farmers Country Fair Food Booth and plan to help with the Chritsmas Tree Lot sale.

Here are a few:

Kiwanis Clubs: 234,200 members, 7,800 clubs in 80 nations. CKI Clubs (College): 12,700 members, 500 clubs in 18 nations.

Key Clubs (High School): 269,000 members, 5,000 clubs in 18 nations. Builder's Clubs (Junior High): 45,000 members. 1,500 clubs in 18 nations.

K Clubs (Elementary): 36,000 members, 1,200 clubs in 8 nations. Action Clubs (Disabled): 9,600 members, 400 clubs in 8 nations.


Our average age is 57 years old, 75 % of us are men and 28 % are women.

Over 40 % of us are adults and fewer than 60 % are youth.

So we are part of a global organization of members dedicated to serving the children of the world. We are nearly 600,000 members strong: we annually raise more than \$107 million and dedicate more than 18 million volunteer hours to strengthen our communities and serve children.

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Survey of Members To Guide the Board on Club Project Funding

Seeking comments from club members, on how the club's project funds should be distributed, the board of directors is conducting a survey of the members. The surveys were distributed at the June 21 and 28 meetings and by e-mail. So far, according to president Dick Bugarske 34 surveys have been returned.

Dick said that he will be sending out another mailing next week and he will have the results in time for the board of directors meeting in July.

The Project Fund survey is being conducted by the board "to help guide our funding decisions over the next few years."

The survey points out that the club has donated approximately \$350,000 over the past six years to the greater Healdsburg Community. These funds have gone to youth and youth organizations with 50 percent going to schools and 50 percent to community organizations.

The board asks you to give them feedback on seven questions:

- Should the donation split between the school and community be:. 50/50 split? ;more to schools? more to community? or other?
- 2. The club has been giving \$15,000 a year to the Healdsburg High School scholarships. Should we keep it to this amount? more for scholarships? Less for scholarships? or?
- 3. Over the years the club has given large donations to community projects leaving less money for other projects. Should fund large projects as needed? keep large donations under \$20,000? keep large donations under \$15,000? keep large donations under \$10,000? Or?
- 4. Our club has obligations to fund the Key Club and Boy Scout Troop 21. Each can receive up to \$3,000 per year. Should we keep these amounts the same? provide more funding for them? provide less funding for the? or?
- 5. Funding decisions are made at board meetings with occasional full membership input: should we keep this process as is ? have more membership input? or?

The last two questions ask you to tell the board where you would like us to donate or spend more money. And lastly where you think we should spend less money.

Dick Bugarske emphasized that your ideas and input are important. If you have not received a copy of the survey to fill out contact him by email at rbugarske@gmail.com, by telephone at 433-1771 or at his home at 238 Theresa Court, Healdsburg 95448.

Accompanying the survey is a list of donations which the club has made over the past six years. The list was put together by treasurer Pete Peterson.

The list is an impressive one pointing out the many community organizations we have helped as well as how we have donated for various needs and improvements at the schools.

The six years community service donations came to \$182,300 and includes such donations as \$3500 to the American Legion annual fireworks display: \$1200 to Healdsburg Animal Shelter, \$33,900 to the Healdsburg Boys and Girls Club, \$17,900 to the Healdsburg Boy Scout Troop 21, \$2,000 to the Fitch Mountain After School/Summer program, \$10,800 to the Future Farmers Country Fair, \$5000 to Habitat for Humanity, \$4,000 Healdsburg Community Nursery School, \$2,600 Food Pantry, \$7,900 Healdsburg High School Boosters Club. \$1,900 Healdsburg High School Graduation Celebration, \$2000 Healdsburg Medical Explorer Post, \$25000 Recreation Park Grandstand Renovation Project, \$9500 Healdsburg Regional Library Youth Science, Math and Children's Books, \$1000 Healdsburg Senior Center computer and installation, \$1800 Pediatric Trauma Center of Kiwanis Cal-Nev-Ha Foundation,\$1400 to the North Country Community Center,\$2200 Kiwanis High School Leadership Program, \$5,408 Key Club, \$13,400 Salvation Army at Lytton, \$2400 Unicef Haiti Relief and Eliminate Maternal Neonatal Tetanus, 6 Miscellaneous donations ranging from \$501 to \$1,000, 60 Miscellaneous at \$500 or less \$16,552.

Donations to the Healdsburg schools amounted to \$165,700 for six years --- \$28,700 to the elementary schools, \$49,000 to the Junior High School and \$85,500 to the Senior High School.

Donations to the elementary schools included \$13,600 for dictionaries to all third grade students, \$6,800 for the enrichment program and \$8,300 to the Public School Access Team.

The Junior High School donation program included \$10,000 for the program to prevent bullying, \$3000 for the eighth grade trip to Washington DC, \$1900 for garden renovation, \$10,000 for the laptop program, \$5300 for the Library book club, \$7000 for the science laboratory equipment, \$11,800 for 30 microscopes.

Programs included in the Senior High School donations were Construction and Sustainability Academy (\$5000), Ceramics Oven Shelves (\$3000), Challenge Day, 2 years (\$5000), Laptop program (\$6500), Scholarships (\$66,000).

The board is anxious to hear what you think and would appreciate receiving your input.

President Dick Bugarske indicated that he already has received some interesting feed back but welcomes more.

Chamber of Commerce Capital Campaign Presented by New CEO

Mo McIlroy who took over as CEO and president of the Chamber of Commerce about five months ago presented at the June 7 meeting one of the Chamber's capital campaigns whereby donors contribute \$1,000 to have their name or business name inscribed on an 8 inch memorial brick. The bricks will be imbedded in the sidewalk in front of the Chamber's new office on Healdsburg Avenue located in the H2 Hotel. The proceeds from this program will be used to help offset the cost of remodeling/rebuilding the Chamber of Commerce building. The old Chamber office located in the two story WPA built building next to the H2 Hotel will be utilized as a Visitors' Center.

A request for the Kiwanis Club to invest in this program was under discussion at the board's June 16 meeting. The request was tabled pending further evaluation as to whether such an expenditure meets the community goals of the club.

In other business the board at its monthly session approved two leaves of absence – six months starting July 1 for Robert Meyer and two months commencing July 1 for Jim Colgan.

The board accepted the resignation of Kelly Sheehy who was recently married and is moving to Virginia. She joined the Kiwanis Club on July 27, 2010.

The Healdsburg Community Nursery School requested that the \$1400 grant to repair the ceiling at the school be reallocated to increase the \$2600 roof repair grant. This request was tabled pending completion of the ceiling repair when final repairs costs will be known.

The payment of the \$2000 grant to the Safe Ambassador Program at the Healdsburg Junior High School was approved for September, 2011

The board also closed its regular session and re-opened into a closed session. An issue of substance was discussed at length and some direction was given to President Bugarske to move forward with a resolution to the issue at hand. Following the adjournment of the closed session, the board reopened the regular session and adjourned the meeting. (Al Pete Peterson contributed to this article).
