

Generous Donation Pledged To Memorial Scholarship Fund

Dougherty explained that the elderly couple who are friends of his asked him to recommend a charity or organization to which they could donate a substantial amount of money. He recommended the Kiwanis Club, he said, because of the club's outstanding work in the community and its honesty and integrity.

The income from the Memorial Scholarship Fund is used to issue scholarships to Healdsburg High School graduating seniors. 4 scholarships of \$1500 each were presented this year. The fund has a value of about \$75,000.

Report of the Official Minutes of August 8, 2002 Board Meeting

President Tim Tuscany convened the meeting to order at 7:10 p.m. in the Healdsburg Police Department. The following officers were present: Tim Tuscany, Nancy Curnow, Vice-president, Neil Iversen, Secretary, Dennis Gary, Administrative Treasurer, Lee Gunnerson, Immediate Past President. Board of Directors present: Fred Haley, Dennis Stead and Dee Whitehall.

MINUTES: The Board of Directors meeting minutes of the July 11, 2002. The motion to accept by Nancy Curnow and seconded by Fred Haley, without changes. The motion was voted on and passed.

SECRETARY'S REPORT: Neil Iversen reported as follows: All bills paid as of August 6, 2002.

DUES: From July 9 to August 6 the club collected \$2,969 from 25 active and 5 senior members.

COMMUNICATIONS: Club members are invited to attend the Lt. Governor's installation dinner in Oakmont on September 14,2002. The dinner will be held at the Berger Center. Tickets are \$25 per person, checks payable to Oakmont Kiwanis Club.

OTHER NOTES: Membership- Victoria Shipley and Vincent Ciolino have attended 3 meetings and are eligible to become members, if the board wishes to act tonight. Will Beeth visited this past meeting. He is a past president and is moving to Healdsburg. He will be a potential member. All club members who participated in the Relay for Life may take credit towards the community service project of the A.I.M.S programs that the current Governor has running. Be sure to take credit on your monthly service hours.

TREASURERS REPORT: Administrative Treasurer Dennis Gary made reports on the administrative accounts. He also reported on the Project account. Nancy Curnow motioned that the board accept and Fred Haley seconded the motion. The motion was voted on and passed.

COMMITTEE REPORTS: Applications for Victoria Shipley and Vincent Ciolino were reviewed and questions answered. Dennis Stead moved we accept the membership of these individuals, Fred Haley seconded the motion. The motion was voted on and passed.

President Tim Tuscany discussed with the board the letter that was mailed to 5 members of the club who have become delinquent in their dues. Members need to make arrangements for repayment of back dues by the September board meeting, as quarterly Kiwanis dues must be paid by September 30. The whole board felt that

there must be some resolution to these matters by September.

DICTIONARIES: Dennis Stead reported on ordering approximately 230 dictionaries for the third grades in Healdsburg, both public and parochial schools. Dennis will buy each book wholesale for \$9.99 from Costco. Books retail for \$24.95. Dennis asked for \$2700 to order the 230 dictionaries. Nancy Curnow made the motion for the same and Lee Gunnerson seconded. The motion was voted on and passed.

NEW BUSINESS: Curry Anton of Healdsburg High School made a presentation on a proposal for LEAP (Lifelong Education and Alternative Programs). The total cost of the year long program is \$19,500. The program counts toward her senior year of high school and her first year of college. She reported that she has raised in excess of \$12,000. The board discussed this matter at length. In the end it was decided that support of this individual program would be essentially a scholarship for a year of private school, and the club already has a scholarship program. No motion was made.

Wheelchair Foundation: Tim presented to the board a packet of information that was left at the end of one of our last club meetings on the Wheelchair Foundation. Essentially this organization funds wheelchairs to the needy in under served areas of the world. They have a generous matching funds operation, whereas a chair that costs \$150, the sponsor provides \$75 and the Wheelchair Foundation matches the other \$75. Several members have already donated to the organization, including some board members. After some discussion it was decided that this idea was better suited for a division or district use to raise money for a large-scale endeavor.

Nancy Curnow announced that the Cloverdale Kiwanis Club is having its installation dinner and anniversary party on September 21.

New Key Club Lt. Governor Matt Emmer was present at the Division Council meeting and asked for support from each club for the coming term. Nancy suggested that the club donate \$150, Lee Gunnerson seconded the motion. The motion was voted on and passed.

In regards to a letter of resignation submitted by Dale Lynch, John Bippart contacted him, they discussed and clarified some membership issues. Dale has decided to continue as a Senior member.

DIVISION BUSINESS: Tim reported that there is a need to continue to support the Lt. Governor Dennis Tuomala. After some discussion Dennis Stead made a motion for \$300 and Jerry Strong seconded the motion. The motion was voted on and passed.

There being no further business the board meeting adjourned at 8:25 p.m.




