After a most tasty repast prepared by the Salvation Army cooks, Capt. Kellerer gave us a talk describing how the men who are "guests" of the Salvation Army at this facility got there, and how they are treated. Most of them were alcoholics or hooked on dope, and come from all walks of life.

All of them are assigned work at the Station, such as helping in the kitchen, tending the Thrift Shop, doing work around the grounds, taking care of the prize herd of cattle that the Army owns, etc. The applicants for admission are getting younger, these days, Capt. Kellerer went on to say, with most of them in their early 20's, Many of them are on dope, and are brought to the facility by their parents, It is felt that 90 days is the right length of time for treatment, although some require longer.

While at the facility the pay is low, starting at \$5.00 per week, up to a top of \$18.00 per week. These sums are not considered "wages" but "gratuities".

Once again, the Salvation Army had found a need and filled it.

Meeting of Sept. 11, 1979


